HAUGHLEY SILHOUETTES REMEMBER THE FALLEN Kim Smith

A village on the outskirts of Stowmarket has again pulled out all the stops to stage a haunting Remembrance tribute to the local men who lost their lives in both world wars.

Forty-one 4ft-tall plywood silhouettes of servicemen have stood guard on Haughley village green each November since 2019, attracting huge numbers of visitors.

The silhouettes were designed by Kieron Palmer, who runs the village bakery. He was inspired to create the installation after planting daffodils on the green in 2018 to celebrate the 150th anniversary of his family's business

As the daffodils grew in clusters, they reminded him of troops and he commissioned a carpenter to create a template of a soldier from a century-old photograph. He then used a jigsaw cutter to create each silhouette over a period of 20 weeks, paying for all the materials.

Haughley lost 31 men in World War One and 10 in World War Two. A small wooden cross at the feet of each one states their name and the year of their death.

Back in 2019, Kieron told reporters: "It's quite poignant that they're on the village green because that is where the young men were recruited during World War One.

"One of the Captains from the Yeomanry turned up and urged them to sign up for King and Country. He assured them that it would all be over in six months and they all marched off to fight.

"Most of them were just teenagers. Sadly, many of them never returned. Four or five were killed when they went over the top on the first day of the Battle of the Somme."



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The dead included a distant relative of Kieron, Boer War veteran Edwin Woods, who was killed at Arras.

He added: "Walking around the silhouettes gives you a feeling of being among the actual men. I get goosebumps and it transposes what you may read on paper to being something physical. It's important to visualise how many died. Just seeing a number means it is sometimes difficult to see how many sacrificed themselves."

Visitors have included people with sight problems, who have commented that they were particularly impressed because they could feel the shapes and visualise those they represented.

Each year the installation raises money for the Royal British Legion as Kieron takes donations in Palmer's Bakery on the edge of the green. His staff also bake and sell poppy-emblazoned muffins and solider silhouette biscuits to add to the total.

Kieron concluded: "It's important that even a small village like Haughley honours the men who fell for them."

LEST WE FORGET Kelvin Dakin

8256, Private Harry Souter, 2nd Battalion, Suffolk Regiment

Born in 1893, Harry was the son of Jonathan and Harriett Souter of Bury Road, Chedburgh.

In the 1911 census he is with the 3rd Battalion at the Depot in Bury St Edmunds.

Harry crossed with the 2nd battalion on the 15th August 1914 and was listed as "Missing" following the Battle of Le Cateau (Casualty List issued by the War Office, 19th September 1914.)

Enquires were made to the International Red Cross, in 1915, by the Chedburgh vicar's wife, Mrs Cave, and a family friend, Mrs Cocksedge, for news of Harry but records show that he had died of wounds sometime between the 26th August and 26th November 1914. He was buried in Hautmont Communal Cemetery:

"Hautmont was captured by the Germans in the early days of the First World War, and it remained in their hands until retaken by the 42nd (East Lancashire) Division on 8 November 1918. The communal cemetery was used by the German troops for the burial of their dead, and the Allied prisoners who died in the local German hospitals were buried there by the authorities of the town."

(Commonwealth War Graves Commission description)



Deep sympathy felt throughout the village for Mrs. and family, especially as she is a widow, and has another son who has been posted as "missing" since August.

No.5589 (formerly 2580), Private, Albert SOUTER, 2nd Battalion, Suffolk Regiment Born in1886, Albert served in France from 30th August 1914 and killed in action on 10th April 1915. He is buried in Suffolk Cemetery, Vierstraat, Belgium

Another brother, George, served in France after 1915 but also died:

No.40471, Private, George SOUTER, 2nd Battalion, Suffolk Regiment Reported wounded 30th August 1917 and 5th October 1918. Died of sickness 14th December 1918. Buried in Huy (La Sarte) Communal Cemetery, Liege. The three brothers are commemorated on the village memorial.
